The YESSS Project was launched with a consortium meeting held in Zaragoza, Spain on February 15-16. During the meeting, discussions were held regarding the business planning, task distribution, activities, and administrative matters. The partners, The Hub Nicosia (CY), INNETICA (SP), Egina (IT), HORIZONTE XXII (SP), FN-FORBUNDET (DK), KEPDER (TR) worked together and led by WIPSEE to establish collaborative, transparent, and descriptive definitions for SSE (Social and Solidarity Economy) and SDGs (Sustainable Development Goals) to facilitate the understanding and knowledge of SSE and the SDGs for youth workers in order to inform them in a simple way and giving them the possibility to enter these fields without taboos and supporting young people in their project processes. As a collective decision, it was highlighted that although there are existing resources in rural areas, the necessary knowledge to effectively utilize these resources is insufficient among youth workers in those areas.
